Future Proofing Our Club

Over the past ten plus years most sports and social clubs in New Zealand have experienced significant losses of members. This phenomenon has been accelerated by the current Covid pandemic. Consequently, a number of sports and social clubs have closed down, amalgamated with other clubs or struggled on with a much reduced membership.

Although prior to Covid we were slowly increasing our membership, once the impact of the pandemic hit, playing numbers have fallen significantly. For example, Thursday nights have gone from 18-20 tables to around 10 tables. A variety of factors are at play: For a number of members avoiding potential exposure to the virus has been important; post lock-downs some will have got out of the habit of coming to bridge or lost interest; for others advancing age, illness, or other demands on their time will have influenced their decision not to continue to play.

In order to ensure our club grows and thrives we have to retain our current membership and attract new members. The majority of our new members come through our lessons programme, and as such they become a "special value" group. We are dependent on them to maintain the long term health of our club. Your committee recognises the importance of attracting and supporting learners and is committed to enhancing the bridge experience of this group through extending a supportive welcoming environment to them

However, we also keep in mind our current members as well. We want them to stay members and enjoy many years of playing bridge. All of us have an important role in this process. We all need to enjoy the company as well as the game by taking the necessary steps to make the club experience enjoyable for ourselves, our partner and our opponents. Simple things such as being a good "host" or "guest" at the table, and avoiding doing things that might annoy or upset others.

As a club we can't just stand back and watch passively as our membership declines and the viability of the club becomes at-risk. Let's all help to ensure that future does not happen.

Speak only of what went right And never criticise Only if they ask Take it upon yourself to advise


They have too much on their minds To remember all our names So for the first few weeks Introduce everyone again.
